## EDUCATORS AND SCHOOL PERSONNEL SHOULD HAVE PRIORITIZED ACCESS TO COVID VACCINATIONS



The Public School Forum of NC commends the more than 180,000 public school personnel and staff who have been working every day to ensure that North Carolina's 1.5+ million students have access to learning opportunities -- through remote learning options or inside of school buildings -- as together we work to mitigate the impacts of COVID-19.

We understand the desire to increase the number of students who have access to in-person learning opportunities in the coming weeks. In order to reopen all public school buildings safely — and for the health and safety of those who are already working and learning in school buildings that have reopened — we must ensure that all educators and school personnel have prioritized access to COVID-19 vaccines along with PPE, social distancing, cleaning supplies, ventilation, and student health checks, to ensure the safety of our educators and

students. North Carolina has administered over 1,000,000 doses of the vaccine, and the total number of teachers and other school personnel represents less than 20% of that amount. North Carolina can do this expediently.

"Another key part of reopening, Fauci said, is to 'get teachers vaccinated as quickly as we possibly can.'" Ed Week COVID rates in North Carolina remain high, and many of our schools serve communities that are disproportionately impacted by COVID-19 and employ many individuals who are at high risk for serious illness. We must ensure that the health and safety of all members of our school communities, especially those who are most impacted by the virus, are prioritized.

School district leaders are best positioned to determine the local needs of their students, teachers and families, and they need continued flexibility to

determine how to best keep their communities safe, relying on local health department assessments, vaccination rates, and other factors to inform local decisions, including whether and how schools should operate under plans A, B,or C.

At least 25 other states, the District of Columbia, and Puerto Rico have accelerated COVID vaccine eligibility for teachers, including Kentucky, which has committed to having all teachers receive the first dose of the vaccine by the end of the week. Maryland, Virginia, New York, and several other states have vaccinated large numbers of educators, as demonstrated in <a href="Ed Week's">Ed Week's</a> Vaccine Tracker.

Since March 2020, educators, administrators, and support personnel have made remarkable efforts to create innovative learning opportunities for their students, as they too endure the
