


Furniture Floor Plan



Color Rationale


Color Theory

Red/Maroon – Strength, Power, Leadership, Courage Determination, Passion, Excitement, Desire, & Love

Blue – Wisdom, Trust, Loyalty, Confidence, Self-Esteem, Faith, Intelligence, Healing, Integrity, & Seriousness

Black/Grey/White – Calm, Stead, Quiet, Timeless, Flexible, Endurance, Simplicity, Spacious, Free, Quiet, Timeless, Flexible, Endurance, Simplicity, Spacious, Free Red/Maroon: Increases your blood pressure and heart rate, enhances metabolism, provokes emotions
Blue: Feeling of being relaxed, calm and serene, at peace, more productive, more inspired

Black/Grey/White: Makes you feel calm, steady, comforted, & stable, Easily combined with other colors



Red and maroon are shown as the most intense colors in this space to easily grab the client's attention and bring emphasize to an area or object. Red raises the energy level in the room which stimulates positivity, passion, liveliness, love, and more. Red and maroon will overpower the black/grey/white because it is an extreme color. Blue is shown as the least intense color in this space because it's the color of calmness. Blue will show stillness and quietness, and give the client a sense of relaxation, and serenity. It will even out the level of intensity of the red.






