SENIOR REQUIREMENTS FOR AGING IN PLACE:

Complex Attributes

- Universal design principles allowing for additional components as aging continues
- Integration of features to prevent living space from appearing accessible
- Various social and physical activities available to keep a young feeling among the residents
- Varied food choices on site such as home delivery, casual ala carte facility and full service restaurant

Individual Unit Attributes

- Use of high end materials in public and private spaces to impart a feeling of luxury
- Available private spaces within the residence such as multiple master suites
- Split floorplan to allow resident and visitors separate living during extended stays
- Large windows and patios to bring natural light and air into the living spaces

MID-CENTURY TRANSITIONAL:


- Clean lines in seating and case goods





