

## PARENTS: Check out the Home Reading Helper!

Read Charlotte is a community-wide effort in Charlotte, NC to improve child literacy by 2025. As part of their project, Read Charlotte has developed the Home Reading Helper, which has several ageappropriate resources to help you read and write



with your child at home! There are tools for children in Pre-K all the way to 3rd grade. In this newsletter we would like to focus on a way to engage your child when you read together - active reading. Check out the rest of the newsletter to learn about the ABCs of Active Reading and how you can use this strategy with Imagination Library books!

## The ABCs of Active Reading

Active reading means reading a book *with* your child, instead of reading *to* your child. In active reading, you and your child engage with the contents of the book and go beyond simply reading the words on the pages.

Active reading works for children aged 6 months to 6th grade. It can be done anywhere - try active reading while riding the bus, during snack time, or before bedtime!



## Ask Questions.

While reading, ask your child questions that start a conversation about the book. Try asking questions that start with **what, who, how,** and **why.** Look for answers that are more in-depth than a 'yes' or 'no' response.



## Build Vocabulary.

Use words in the story to expand your child's vocabulary. Ask your child what words mean and connect new words with pictures in the story. For some words, try using your facial expressions or sounds to explain them to your child.



## Connect to Kids' Worlds.

Make connections between the story and things your child already knows, has experienced, or does each day. You can connect character's actions to things your child sees you or family members do too!

By remembering to try the ABCs of Active Reading, you can help improve your child's reading through everyday activities and play!

#### Ask questions.

Look at the front cover. **Where** is Lily? **What** is she doing?


Why does Lily like to wear her mask?

Why does Lily's teacher put the mask away?

**How** do think Lily felt about making a new friend?


#### Build Vocabulary.

#### Connect to Kids' Worlds.

Has your child ever worn a mask or a costume? Talk about how it made them feel. If your child has a favorite piece of clothing to wear, talk about why they like to wear it so often. When Lily makes a birthday wish or goes to the doctor, talk about a time your child has done those things.



#### Ask questions.

**Do you think** it was hard or easy for the girl to stay quiet? **How** can you tell?

What were the girl and her father looking for? Why did they look at night?

How did the girl's father find the owl?

#### Connect to Kids' Worlds.

Has your child ever seen snow? Talk with them about what it was like to play in the snow and about how it snows in the winter. Does your child know what an owl is? Talk about other big birds you may have seen together at the park or zoo. The little girl hoped she and her dad would see an owl. What is something your child has hoped or wished for?
